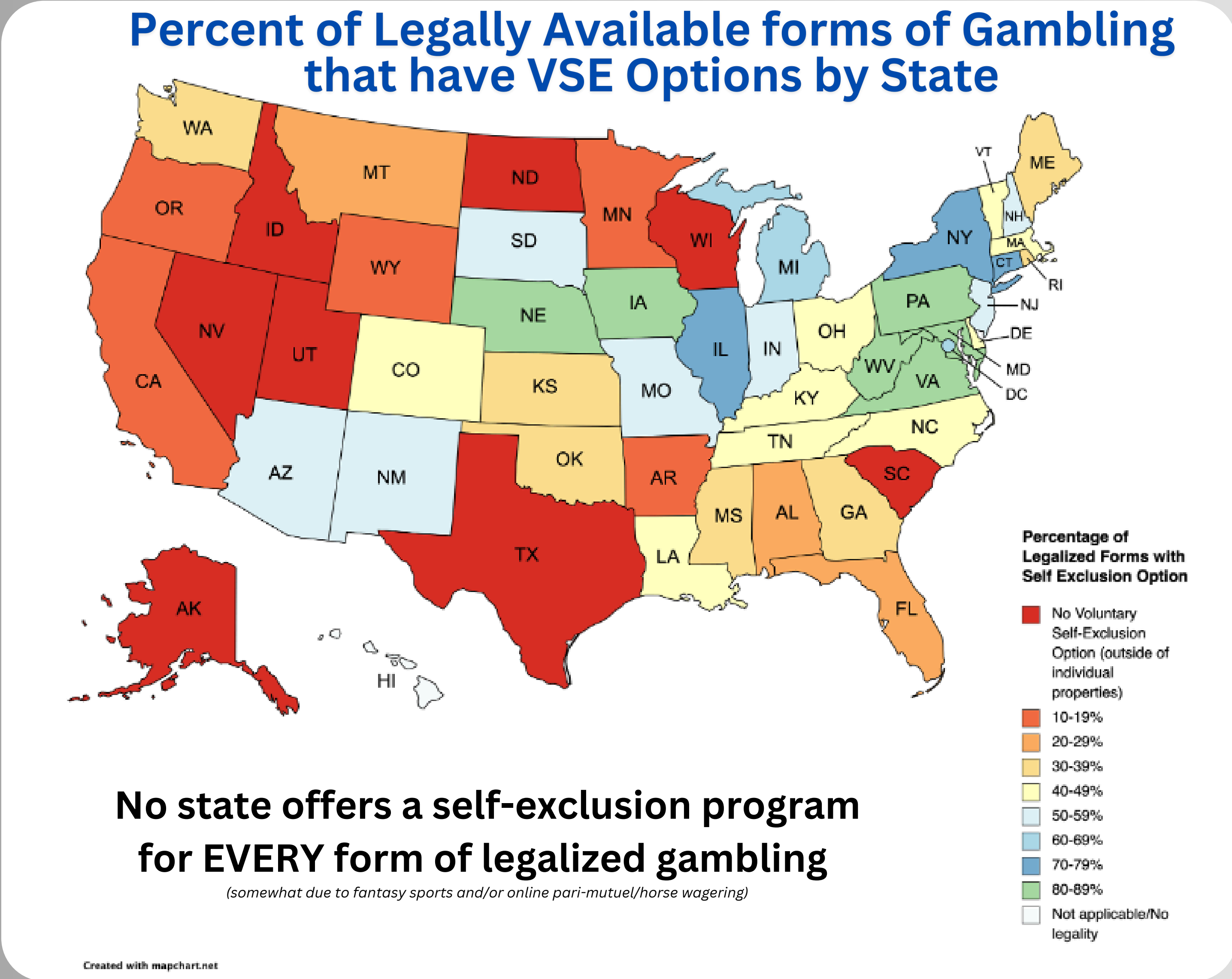
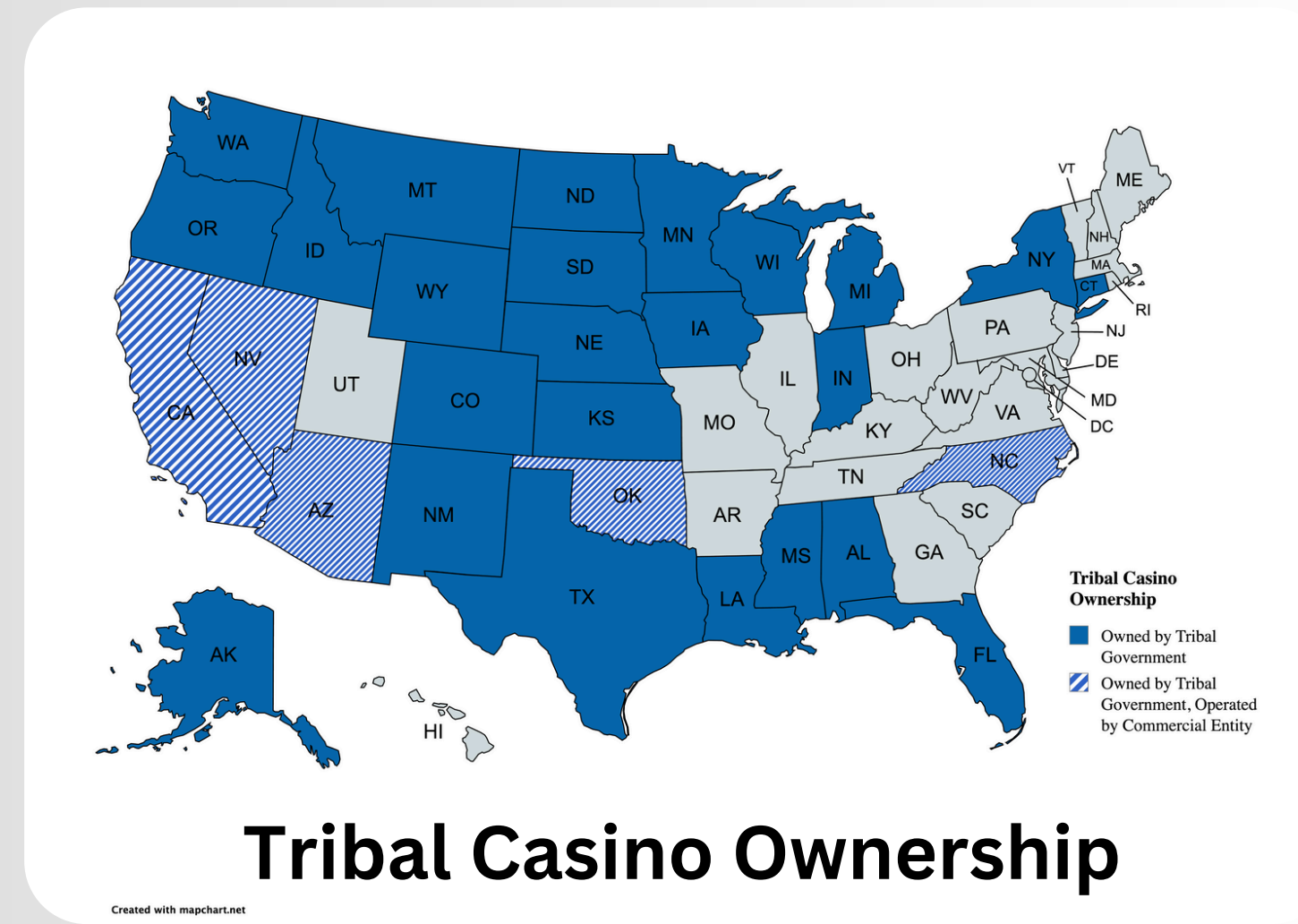
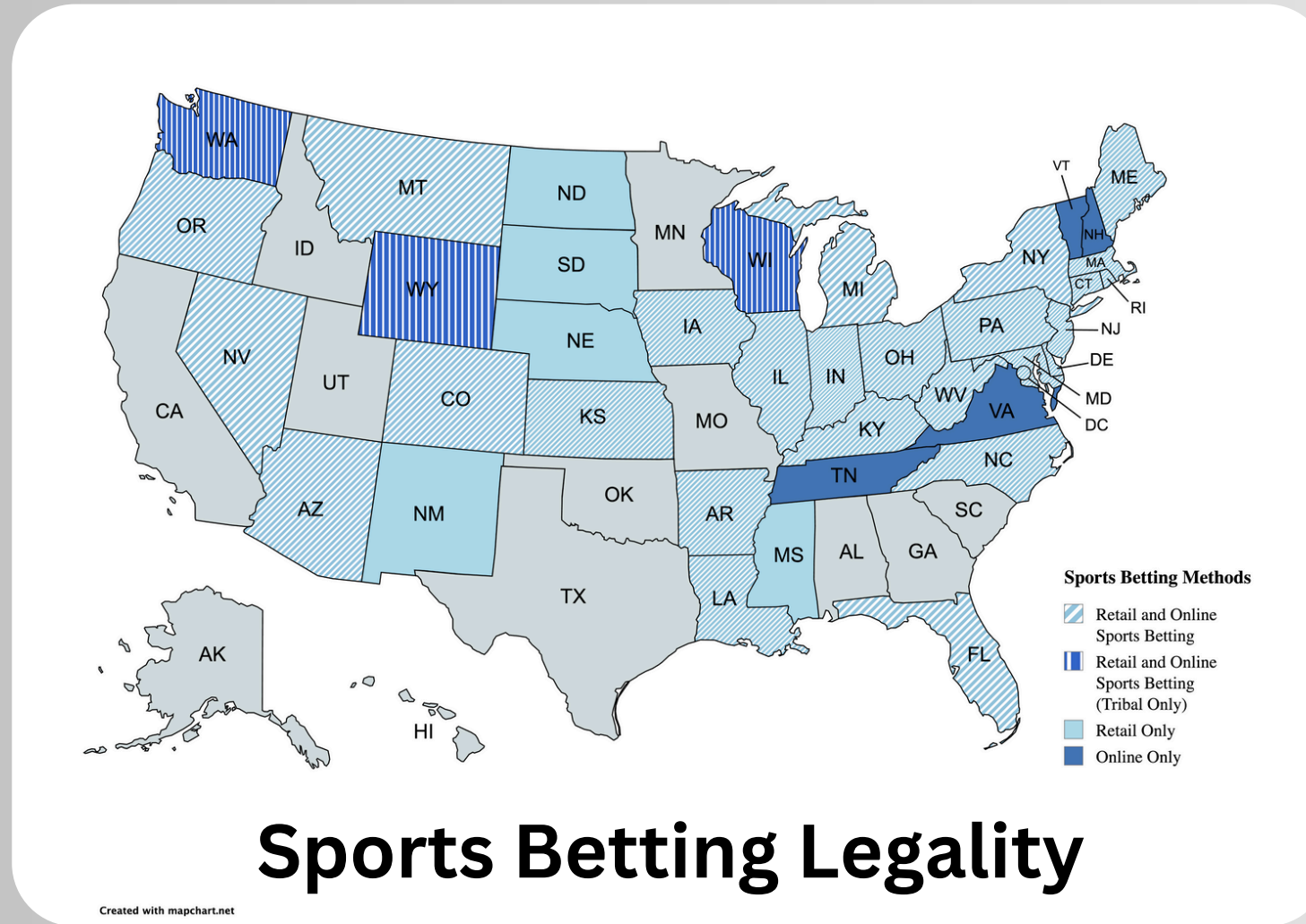
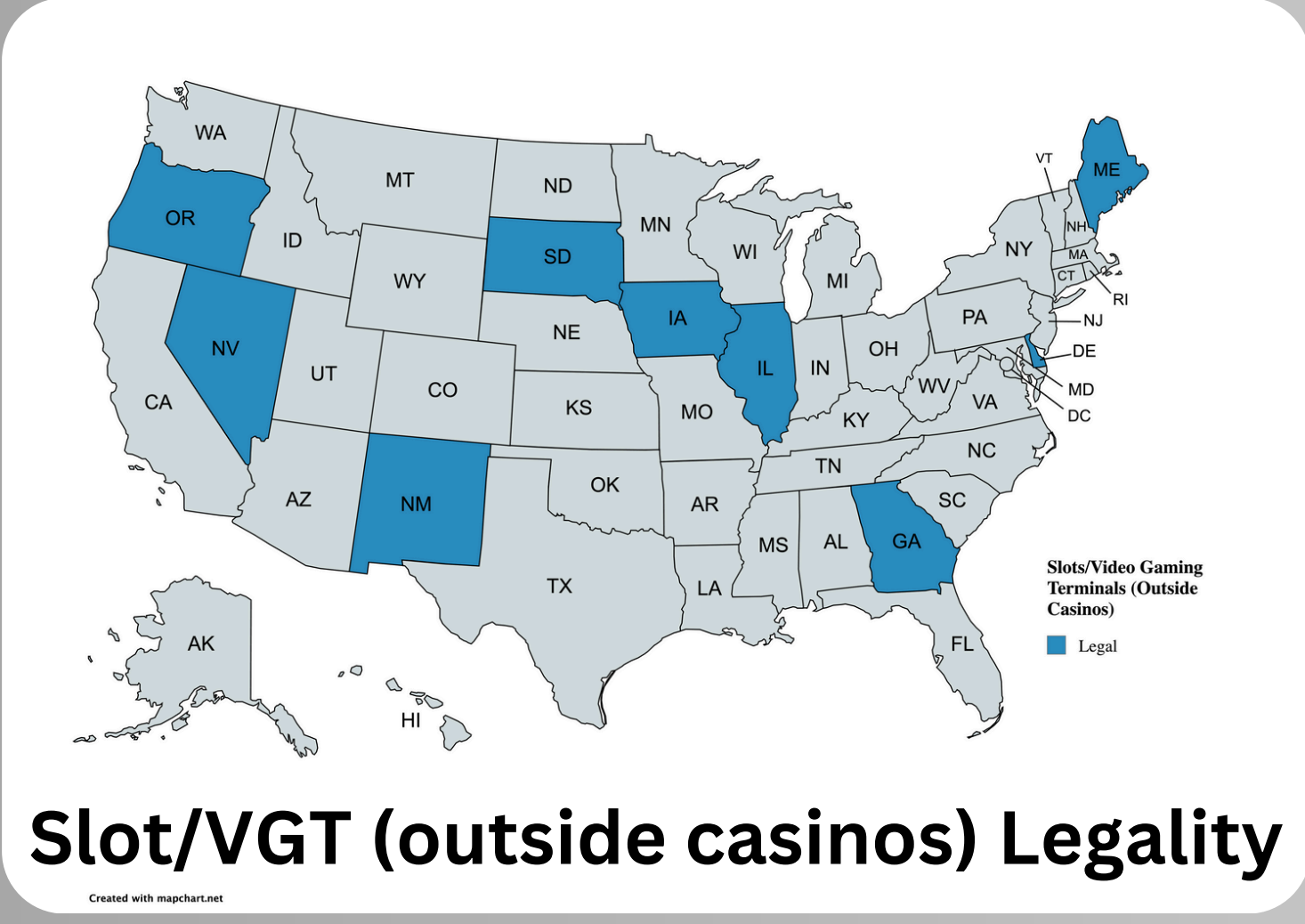


Voluntary Self-Exclusion Based on Legality

Mapping Gambling Type Legality* Examples

(*Legality does not equal availability, as people have access to many types of gambling that are not legislatively legalized in their state)



Number of legal forms of gambling and percent of voluntary self-exclusion program availability has a statistically significant positive linear relationship ($r=.717, p<.001$)

Highlighted Findings:

- Online/mobile forms of gambling have highest rates of voluntary self-exclusion (VSE) programs
- Most widely available forms of legal gambling (fantasy sports/ bingo/ lottery) have low levels of legally required VSE programs
- Voluntary self-exclusion name and procedures vary widely between states
 - “Voluntary Self-Exclusion” and “Self-Exclusion” are most prevalent names
 - Providing one name & procedure for all VSE programs would assist in helping people find the program no matter where they live
 - In-person is the most prevalent process



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
